REQUIREMENT 3 With your parent's or guardian's permission, talk to a military veteran, law enforcement officer, member of the fire department, or someone else approved by your den leader. Talk about his or her service to the community or country. After you have visited with the individual, write a short thank-you note.

In the wild, adult wolves in a pack work together to protect the whole pack from danger. Men and women keep our communities and our country safe by serving as law enforcement officers, emergency care providers, firefighters, and military service members.



When you meet with a first responder, community worker, or military veteran from your area, shake hands and thank the person for his or her service. Ask about the reasons he or she became a public servant or volunteered to serve in the military. Find out more about the work he or she does to improve the community or keep us safe here at home.
